

EASTERN BERKS FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS

Your Eastern Berks Fire Department has begun to move into our recently purchased property at the intersection of Rt 100 and Hoffmansville Rd in Washington Township. Rescue Engine 97 is now housed in the building, and personnel respond there when that truck is required for accidents and fires. We have equipped that building with fire radios, internet, and response displays. Since that structure also contains an existing school bus business, which will continue to occupy much of the building, we will work with those renters to share more space. In September, we completed another



season of fire and rescue protection for the racers, race cars, and spectators at Grandview Speedway on Passmore Road. It is a hot, dusty, and exhausting duty, but one we have performed for decades. In October each year, we visit local schools to make Fire Prevention presentations. Our 100% volunteer personnel use vacation days to teach fire safety to students at Washington Elementary, Bally Mennonite Preschool, St. Frances Academy, and other learning venues.

We constantly train in fire suppression, vehicle rescue techniques, hazardous materials handling, and medical emergencies; all while spending time raising money to buy the apparatus and equipment to protect you. We are pleased to announce that we recently signed a contract to have a new Attack truck (mini pumper) built in nearby Chester County for delivery next year, after the original supplier couldn't manufacture it until 2026. This unit will be able to get into the narrow rural driveways we often encountered in the township. The department appreciates the support and cooperation of the township, its officials and its residents.

REFLECTIVE ADDRESS SIGN PROGRAM

To avoid delays with emergency responses to Township properties, Eastern Berks Fire Department has a program to provide road side reflective address markers and to document special conditions that responders should be aware of. The price per sign has increased to \$30. Eastern Berks Fire Department is providing the signs as a public service and only charges the actual cost of the signs. 5 TIPS for Exercising Safely in Cold Weather

Don't let falling temperatures stop you from exercising outdoors. By taking a few extra steps to stay safe, you can walk, run, ski, ice skate, and more.



Warm up and cool down. Stretch or walk in place to prepare and restore your muscles before and after a workout.

Pick the right clothes. Dress in several layers of loose clothing to trap warm air between them. Wear a waterproof coat or jacket if it's snowy or rainy, and don't forget a hat, scarf, and gloves.

Be extra careful in snow and ice. Check sidewalks before using them. Wear nonskid, rubber-soled, low-heeled shoes to help prevent slipping.

Check the forecast. If it's too windy, cold, icy, or wet outside, consider staying indoors and using an online workout video or your own routine.

Be prepared. Know the signs of hypothermia, inform others of your outdoor whereabouts, and carry a fully charged mobile phone.

In the fall of 2024, Washington Township enacted a revised ordinance for Chapter 76 – Parks, Recreation Areas and Open Spaces. A copy of the revised ordinance is located on the township's website. The ordinance includes revised rules & regulations for our parks and open spaces, and we encourage all user of our recreational facilities to become familiar with the revised ordinance.

COMMUNITY ROOM RENTALS

The Community Room may be used for activities such as parties, showers, meetings, dinners and other approved gatherings and can accommodate 60 to 70 persons comfortably. It is equipped with a kitchen sink, refrigerator, microwave oven, standard stove, air conditioning and lots of counter space.

Rental fees are as follows:

- O Residents: \$150.00 (\$60.00 for rental and \$90.00 security deposit)
- O Non Residents: \$175.00 (\$75.00 for rental and \$100.00 security deposit)

Township Committee Members:

O \$100.00 (\$40.00 for rental and \$60.00 security deposit). Note: This is a one-time use per year per family at this rate for all Committee Members.

Meetings:

O \$75.00 (\$25.00 for rental and \$50.00 for security deposit). Does NOT include use of facilities except for coffee and light refreshments.

THE ABOVE RATES ARE ACCEPTABLE FOR FOUR (4) HOURS. AFTER THAT, \$15.00 PER HOUR WILL BE CHARGED.

It is best to phone or stop in the Township Office first to look over the facilities. If you are interested in a particular date to rent the community room, the completed application (available on website) and a check made payable to Washington Township will reserve the date.



PICNIC PAVILION RENTALS

Consider having your family reunion or birthday party at our large picnic pavilions. We have pavilions available at both the Washington Township Park on Victoria Drive and the Barto Community Park on Barto Road. Each has electricity, nine - 6 person picnic tables and two - 8 person handicapped tables. There are port-o-potties nearby. Outdoor activities include a walking path, playground, basketball, and baseball & sports fields (when not in use with our sports teams' partners).

Rental Fees are as follows:

- O Washington Township Residents: \$100.00 (\$50.00 for Rental and \$50.00 for Security Deposit) Please note: If no damage done to the pavilion area, the Security Deposit will be returned, thus the actual fee for a resident is \$50.00).
- O Non-Residents: \$150.00 (\$100.00 for Rental and \$50.00 for Security Deposit) Please note: If no damage done to the pavilion area, the Security Deposit will be returned, thus the actual fee for a non-resident is \$100.00).

It is best to phone the Township Office FIRST if you are interested in a particular date to rent the pavilion to be sure that the pavilion is free for your special event. That way you can reserve the date, fill out the Application along with your check to reserve the pavilion and return to the Township Office.



ON-LOT SEPTIC MANAGEMENT

Washington Township has a Sewage Management Ordinance (No. 1995-1) that requires the routine maintenance of all on-lot septic systems in the Township.

This Ordinance is a Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PADEP) requirement and requires that all on-lot sewage disposal systems be pumped out by a licensed and Township approved pumper/hauler selected by the property owner, at least once every three years with documentation of the pumping being provided to the Township from your hauler by December 31, 2025. Once you provide the Township. If you are not sure when you are due for your pumping, please contact the Township.

Why You Need Your Septic System Inspected

- Protect your property value. An unkept septic system can lower your property's value and could lead to costly system repairs.
- Protect our eco-system. Contaminated wastewater poses a threat to our local environment. Malfunctioning septic systems can disperse bacteria and toxins to our natural waterways, which in turn can spread into our township's wildlife, endangering native plants and species.
- Protect you and your neighbor's health. Wastewater can contain disease causing bacteria and toxic chemicals. If maintained properly, a septic system will filter and remove most of these dangerous substances. Otherwise, it can leak causing groundwater contamination, impacting the local groundwater that everyone in the Township relies on our as our source of drinking water.

What You Need to Know

Licensed pumper/haulers are required to register with Washington Township and provide documentation from the PADEP.

A list of registered pumper/haulers is available at the Township Building and on our website.

After your pumping occurs, a report will be completed by the pumper/hauler and provided to the homeowner. It is the responsibility of the homeowner to provide the completed report to the Township within 30 days of occurrence. This report will identify property owner information, the type and size of the system and any observed conditions which may be evidence of a system malfunction. If observed conditions are present, at the time of pumping, the Township will be notified and will recommend that the property owner contact the Township Sewage Enforcement Officer.

2025 SEWER RATES

EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 2025

Quarterly sewer rates were changed to \$280, a decrease of \$10.00 per quarter.

BILLING INFORMATION

Bills to be paid monthly, at a rate of \$93.33. Your account must be paid in full to take advantage of monthly plan. Bills may be placed in black mailbox outside of the township building or mailed into the township.

PAYMENT INFORMATION

Online bill pay is now available. We also accept credit/debit cards over the phone. For more details, please review information available at www.washtwpberks.org. Checks/money orders should be made payable to Washington Township. CASH IS NOT ACCEPTED

ANNUAL DISCOUNT

A 2% discount is offered to residents who pay their bill in full. Must be paid by March 31st, to take advantage of discount. The discounted price is \$1,097.60 for each Equivalent Dwelling Unit.

REMOVING SNOW AND ICE SAFELY



When the driveway and walkways are coated in a thick blanket of snow, it's time to get a shovel out for what some consider to be a dreaded chore. But before you tackle the first snowfall of the season, take some time to read these safety snow shoveling tips to help avoid any potential injuries.

Snow shoveling can lead to a number of health risks for many people, from back injuries to heart attacks. The mix of cold temperatures and physical exertion increases the workload on the heart, which may increase the risk of a heart attack for some. According to the American Heart Association, even walking through heavy, wet snow can place strain on your heart.

The following tips can help keep you safer when you set out to shovel:

• Warm up. Warm your muscles before heading out to shovel by doing some light movements, such as bending side to side or walking in place.

• **Push rather than lift.** Pushing the snow with the shovel instead of lifting can help reduce the strain on your body. When lifting snow, bend your knees and use your legs when possible.

- **Choose your shovel wisely.** Ergonomically designed shovels can help reduce the amount of bending you have to do.
- **Lighten your load.** Consider using a lighter-weight plastic shovel instead of a metal one to help decrease the weight being lifted.
- **Hit the pause button.** Pace yourself and be sure to take frequent breaks. Consider taking a break after 20 to 30 minutes of shoveling, especially when the snow is wet.
- **Consider multiple trips.** Consider shoveling periodically throughout the storm to avoid having to move large amounts of snow at once.
- **Keep up with snowfall.** Try to shovel snow shortly after it falls, when it's lighter and fluffier. The longer snow stays on the ground, the wetter it can become. Wet snow is heavier and harder to move.
- Wear layers. Dress in layers and remove them as you get warm to help maintain a comfortable body temperature.
- Stay hydrated. Drink plenty of water to stay hydrated while shoveling.

If you don't exercise on a regular basis, are middle-aged or older, or have any health conditions, such as heart disease or high blood pressure, you should check with your doctor before doing any strenuous shoveling. Consider using a snowblower or snow removal service as an alternative means of snow removal.



Friendly Reminder to Residents about snow and ice removal requirements

Snow and ice not only pose a potential risk to you but also to others. As a property owner, you're responsible for making a reasonable effort to keep public walking areas around your property clear of snow and ice.

Please make sure that no sports equipment is left in the roadway or protrudes into the roadway. Basketball nets that are in or hang out into the township right-of-way make snow removal very difficult and potentially dangerous for our staff. The Roads Crew appreciates your assistance with making snow removal efficient and safe for all members of our community.

KIDS CRAFTS - YARN WRAPPED CHRISTMAS TREE ORNAMENTS

What you need: green yarn, pom poms in various sizes and colors or small cut out color stars and circles, glitter pom poms are optional but certainly fun, cardboard, scissors, white school glue

Directions: 1) Cut the triangles out of cardboard (this being a job for the adult as cardboard can be quite tricky to cut. 2) Tie the yarn to the triangle, somewhere in the middle. You can add some glue to secure the yarn before continuing. 3) Add a generous amount of white school glue on one side of the triangle. 4) Start wrapping the yarn all around the triangle – make sure you wrap the yarn around all 3 sides of the triangle. 5) When you are happy with how the wrapped tree looks like, finish up by tying the yarn – make a knot and secure it with some glue. You can add more glue in order to glue on the pom poms (if you were super generous with the white school glue before, there might be enough already). 6) If you want to make this into a Christmas ornament just tie some yarn to the back/top of your Yarn Wrapped Christmas Tree Ornaments and you are ready to go.

What We Do

The Washington Township Parks & Recreation provide benefits to community public health and economic development by managing approximately 100 acres of public access to our parks, nature preserve and open spaces. As a recipient of funds from the multiple foundations and state agencies in 2024, our park system will benefit immensely. These funds will allow for much-needed program upgrades, facility enhancements, and infrastructure projects to be completed.

2024 Highlights

- Submitted multiple grant applications to support 5 Park & Recreation projects, including Niantic Road Pedestrian Improvement, Barto Community Park Master Plan, Washington Township Playground Replacement, Townshipwide Radio System Upgrades and Township-wide Security Upgrades.
- Grant Funding: Parks & Recreation submitted grant applications totaling \$552,760 and secured grants totaling \$56,050. Total recreation grants received 2023 2024 \$86,050.
- Finalized the Washington Township Comprehensive Recreation, Parks and Open Spaces Plan.
- Began working on accomplishing the recommendations and goals contained within the Comprehensive Recreation, Parks and Open Spaces Plan.
- Conducted 4 community events, including two Famers Markets, Craft Fair and a Community Bonfire.
- Worked with the Township Manager to revise our biannual Township Newsletter and produced both a 2024 summer and winter Newsletters.
- Designed and received approval of a Parks & Recreation logo.
- Revised the Washington Township Parks and Recreation website, including the addition of general information, photographs and park maps.
- Coordinated and oversaw the start of a wetlands study at the Washington Township Park by Kutztown University students and faculty.
- Supported the Board of Supervisors in enacting a revised Parks & Recreation Regulations ordinance.
- Supported the Board of Supervisors in enacting a Parks & Recreation Board ordinance.
- Supported the Board of Supervisors in revising field rental agreements with 3 sport clubs that utilize our parks.
- Several improvements were made at the parks this year. Water well testing allowed for water to be available to residents at the Barto Community Park. Lighting upgrades were also completed at the Barto Community Park.
- Coordinated and assisted the Perkiomen Watershed Conservancy with Spring Cleanup at 3 locations within the
 Township, including the West Branch Perkiomen Creek, Barto Community Park and Washington Township Park.
- Participated in the Pottstown Area Regional Recreation Committee.
- Supported the Board of Supervisors in consolidating and renaming our two parks and nature preserve.

Moving Forward

2024 was a great year for Parks & Recreation in Washington Township. The Recreation Advisory Committee spent the majority of their time building the foundation for a better park system in the future. The Recreation Advisory Committee, along with the Board of Supervisor and Township Staff, are excited to see what is instore for 2025. Looking forward, in 2025 we envision more events for our residents, developing master plans for the Barto Community and Washington Township Parks, and moving forward with the Niantic Road Pedestrian Improvement Project and Township-wide Radio Upgrades.

PROPOSED EMERGENCY SERVICES TAX

The Washington Township Board of Supervisors has been in discussions with the Eastern Berks Fire Department (EBFD) and the Bally Community Ambulance Association (Bally EMS) about a proposed Emergency Services Tax in the Township. Because of the potential financial strains any additional taxes can have on residents of our Township, the Township Board of Supervisors will be placing the proposed Emergency Services Tax as a ballot initiative during the 2025 primary election. More information about this proposed Emergency Services Tax can be found on the township's website.

2025 PAVING & ROAD PROJECTS

Our 2025 road paving projects will include application of oil & chips to sections of Countyline Road and the full depth reclamation on Stauffer Road. It is anticipated that these projects will begin after the end of the 24/25 school year. The township will also be working on repairing winter damage and general road surface maintenance throughout the year. Based on available information, the PADOT will commence work on the resurfacing of Route 100 and upgrades to pavement marking at the West Branch Perkiomen Creek bridge on Forgedale Road.

The Barto Road re-alignment plans have been finalized and we have been patiently waiting for the utility companies to move the necessary utility lines (work has started). The project is slated to move forward spring 2025 and be completed by the fall. We anticipate that during the construction phase of the project, there may be times when traffic will need to be detoured around Barto Road. The re-alignment project will add an additional 1.5 acres of park land to the Barto Community Park.

In addition to paving and raod projects, the Township is planning to move forward with installing a crosswalk on Niantic Road at the Washington Township Park. The new crosswalk will allow park users to safely traverse Niantic Road.



NEW PUBLIC WORKS BUILDING

During the summer and fall of 2024, the new Washington Township Public Works Building was erected at the municipal facility. The project is slated to be completed by the end of 2024. The new Public Works Building serves for much needed storage and also includes a full size wash bay to help maintain our fleet of equipment and vehicles.

CHRISTMAS TREE RECYCLING PROGRAM

The Public Works Department Christmas Tree Recycling Program will take place Thursday, December 26, 2025, through Monday, January 20, 2025. While the program is running, you may bring your Christmas tree to the municipal building.

Replace Smoke Alarms Every 10 Years

Age matters when it comes to your smoke alarms. Check the manufacture dates on your smoke alarms today!





A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat and fire.



Test smoke alarms at least once a month by pushing the test button.



Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level of the home, including the basement. Larger homes may need more alarms. For the best protection, make sure all smoke alarms are interconnected. When one sounds, they all sound.

If the smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside. Go to your outside meeting place.



Call the fire department from a cellphone or a neighbor's phone. Stay outside until the fire department says it's safe to go back inside.
